#### Elizabeth Hoffman

#### Professor of Economics, Iowa State University President Emerita, University of Colorado Systems

Elizabeth Hoffman has enjoyed an extraordinary career as a researcher, mentor, and administrator. She began her career as a historian, earning a PhD in history from the University of Pennsylvania in 1972 and working as an Assistant Professor at

the University of Florida. Dr. Hoffman then returned to graduate school in economics, earning her PhD from the California Institute of Technology in 1979. This led to a distinguished career as an economics professor, working at Northwestern, Purdue, Wyoming, and Arizona.

Dr. Hoffman's research featured seminal contributions to experimental economics, law and economics, and cliometrics. The experiments that Dr. Hoffman conducted with Kevin McCabe, Keith Shachat, and Vernon Smith using double blind techniques to socially isolate subjects remain some of the most influential work ever conducted on other-regarding preferences, fundamentally changing how economists conceptualize other-regarding preferences. Her work with Matt Spitzer used insights from economic experiments to address fundamental issue in law and economics.

In the late 90s, Dr. Hoffman began her work mentoring two groups of junior women economists through programs sponsored by the American Economic Association's Committee on the Status of Women in the Economics Profession. This mentoring work was enormously influential, helping launch the careers of many prominent women economists (Bogan, Chen, Croson, Malmendier, Razzolini, Solnick, Vesterlund, and Washington). In large part due to her work as a mentor, Dr. Hoffman was awarded the American Economic Association's 2010 Carolyn Shaw Bell Award for improving the status of women in the economics profession. It is a sign of Dr. Hoffman's vast influence that three of her mentees have also won this award. Dr. Hoffman has served the profession in many other ways beyond mentorship. She served as the fourth president (and first woman president) of the Economic Science Association, the primary professional organization for experimental economics. She also served as a founding trustee for the Cliometric Society and the International Foundation for Research in Experimental Economics.

Midway through her career, Dr. Hoffman shifted to a focus on administration. She served as Dean of Arts and Sciences at Iowa State (1993 – 1997), Provost at the University of Illinois, Chicago (1997 – 2000), President at the University of Colorado (2000 – 2005), and Provost at Iowa State (2005 – 2012). Since stepping down as provost, Dr. Hoffman has continued her productive career as a professor, producing numerous research articles and advising large numbers of PhD students.



#### Catherine Eckel

Sara and John Lindsey Professor, University Distinguished Professor

Texas A&M University

Dr. Catherine Eckel is the Sara and John Lindsey Professor in the Liberal Arts and a University Distinguished Professor at Texas A&M University, where

she directs the Behavioral Economics and Policy Program. Previously, she held faculty positions at the University of British Columbia, Virginia Tech, and the University of Texas at Dallas, where she founded the Center for Behavioral and Experimental Economic Science. With a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Virginia, Dr. Eckel is an award-winning educator and advisor, having guided numerous Ph.D. dissertations. Her research and mentorship have significantly advanced the field of behavioral economics. In recognition of her contributions, she received the Carolyn Shaw Bell Award from the American Economic Association for her efforts in mentoring women in economics.

Tony Kwasnica

Brim Eminent Scholar Chair in Economics

Dr. Anthony Kwasnica is the Brim Eminent Scholar Chair in Economics at Florida State University. He holds a Ph.D. in Social Science from the California Institute of Technology. Dr. Kwasnica's research

focuses on the role of private information in economic systems, with an emphasis on both theoretical and experimental (laboratory) approaches. His work spans multiple areas, including auction design, market mechanisms, and decision-making processes. Dr. Kwasnica's contributions have been widely recognized, and he has published extensively in leading academic journals. Additionally, he has been involved in numerous interdisciplinary projects, further enriching his research and its applications in real-world economic systems.

Economics from Harvard University. Dr. Rosenblat's primary research interest is in experimental economics, focusing on the effects of physical attractiveness in the labor market, trust in societies, and social learning. Her recent work includes innovative web-based field experiments involving real-world social networks. An esteemed researcher, she has published extensively in top-tier journals and is actively involved with Innovations for Poverty Action, contributing to impactful economic research and policy development.

As a former president of the Economic Science Association, Dr. Chen has made significant contributions to the field. She has received numerous awards, including the Carolyn Shaw Bell Award from the American Economic Association. Dr. Chen also serves as a Department Editor of *Management Science*.

Lise Vesterlund

Andrew W. Mellon Professor of Economics

She holds a Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Dr. Vesterlund's influential research explores gender differences in competition, confidence, and expectations, contributing to the understanding of the gender gap in advancement. She is the co-author of the acclaimed book *The No Club: Putting a Stop to Women's Dead-End Work*. Additionally, she directs the Behavioral Economics Design Initiative and the Pittsburgh Experimental Economics Laboratory, further advancing the field through her leadership and innovative studies. Dr. Vesterlund's research has had a profound impact on both policy and practice, making her a leading figure in her discipline.

## Kevin McCabe Professor of Economics and Law

George Mason University

Dr. Kevin McCabe is a Professor of Economics and Law at George Mason University, affiliated with the Interdisciplinary Center for Economic Science (ICES), the Krasnow Institute for Advanced Study, the Mercatus

Center, and the Center for Law and Neuroeconomics. He holds a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. McCabe is renowned for his research in experimental economics, neuroeconomics, and computational economics. His work bridges economic theory and experimental methods, enhancing our understanding of economic decision-making. Additionally, he is a distinguished research scholar for the International Foundation for Research in Experimental Economics (IFREE). Dr. McCabe's approach and methodologies have significantly contributed to the fields of economics and law.

### Tom Palfrey

Flintridge Foundation Professor of Economics and Political Science

California Institute of Technology


Dr. Thomas Palfrey is the Flintridge Foundation Professor of Economics and Political Science,

Emeritus, at the California Institute of Technology. He holds a Ph.D. from Caltech and a B.A. and M.A. from the University of Michigan. Dr. Palfrey's research spans game theory, political economy, and experimental economics. He co-developed the quantal response equilibrium and founded several experimental social science labs, including SSEL at Caltech and CASSEL at UCLA. He has held visiting positions at numerous prestigious institutions and received multiple fellowships and awards, including the William H. Riker Prize for Political Science. Dr. Palfrey's work has greatly influenced economic theory and political science, integrating theoretical models with empirical research.
